To polish and groom the students to meet the tough standards of the competitive world, the college offers nine courses to make the students eligible for professional courses and enhance their knowledge. The college designs the syllabus to these courses. The college conducts these courses to improve the competitiveness of the students, to augment their potential for a good placement at government jobs and to start their own independent ventures.

 The college alumnae have reported that value added courses facilitated students to think analytically, consider different social and historical perspectives, work as part of a team,

- write and speak effectively, gain entry to a career, prepare for career change or advancement and be politically and socially aware.

- The students have an edge over others because of various value added courses conducted apart from the regular classes in coloration with various industry partners and certification body.
- The students got more success at the time of placement interview depends upon their excellent communication skills, vocabulary, verbal and nonverbal communication.
- The students who have completed the LAMP course successfully will be suitable for working as developers in the IT industries.
- The students are more successful in careers; that is, they tend to hold higher positions, are happier and earn more money.
- NSCAS graduates entered the workforce with the confidence and self-esteem that carry their forward – no matter the circumstances or challenges.
- Value Added Course is a strong emphasis on developing a business idea, considering all
 the factors and then using the business plan to start up a business.
- Students have cleared TNPSC, SET, ICWAI and CA examinations and IAS first level examination.
- Many students are placed at the secured jobs i.e.) both governmental and private sector.
